## From the Rector's Corner

*For God alone my soul in silence waits. (Psalm 62:5)*

I keep thinking of those moments after Jesus' birth and before the Angels, Shepherds and Wise Men come bustling in to see the newborn King. I think of Mary, holding her child, wrapping him in swaddling clothes, smelling his sweet scent, kissing his face, and pondering this miracle of the Holy Spirit. I think of Joseph and what must have been going through his head. Ordered back to his hometown to be registered, his young wife, the child he was going to provide for until adulthood. I image the awed hush as no one spoke, the baby falling asleep, the mother listening to the sounds of his breathing. Both parents waiting and wondering what was going to happen next. What it would mean to raise the Son of God in their simple home.

A bit later we would hear about the Shepherds rushing in to see the promised child. The Angel had filled the sky with light and the message: "Do not be afraid; for see-- I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord" Then suddenly the sky was filled with heavenly hosts singing:

"Glory to God in the highest heaven,  
and on earth peace among those whom he favors!"

and as the Shepherds depart in joy and wonder, Mary silently "ponders all these things in her heart."

We seem to have a natural aversion to silence – we want to fill it with busyness and sound – we have our favorite radio station, Alexa, or playlist queued up at home, in the car, on walks. We are blessed to live a part of the world where we can find silence, where at times the night air is filled only with the sounds of nature. Yet it is in these quiet moments that God speaks to our heart and soul. Whispering words of encouragement, condemnation, inspiration, sadness, joy, plans for the future, reconciliation, healing, and hope.

This year St James is going to offer more opportunities to connect with God in prayer and silence. We are going to maintain a prayerful attitude as we enter the Sanctuary. We will observe a minute of silence after the sermon. The Church will be open for prayer for two hours a day – five days a week. Sometimes we will offer a service, sometimes just in silence. I encourage you to add times of silence to your daily practice as well, 5 minutes of meditating on the Scripture of the day, or 5 minutes after your night prayers to open your heart to God's response, maybe 5 minutes when you wake to hear the sound of His voice. Discover the still small voice that dwells within you and leads you in right pathways.

May the peace of God which passes all understanding keep your hearts and minds in the knowledge and love of God and of His son Jesus Christ.

### **"Be still and know that I am God." Ps 16:10**

Silence can be uncomfortable or comforting. While we don't expect or anticipate total silence during worship, I do think some silence is essential for the spiritual life.

I was amused by this article from 1966<sup>1</sup>, "Anything slow is quite intolerable. The hymns must be in double time, and every item in the service brief. If the minister pauses during the prayer or the sermon, the assumption is he is stopping for ideas. Instead of stimulating private meditation by the worshipers, the silence arouses their sympathy. They fear he has forgotten! If he waits a half minute, they are worried. He must be ill. Unless perchance he took the precaution to suggest "a few moments of silent prayer," in which case they soon get uneasy, restless, and bored. The horror of the pause is an exceedingly common experience."

Scripture reminds us that Elijah, running for his life, found God not in the wind, earthquake, or fire, but in "a sound of sheer silence." (1 Kings 19:12) Jesus, throughout his ministry, sought refuge and prayer in the quiet of the desert where he rested in God.

Silent periods of prayer and meditation at home and in our worship can bring our focus back to God, calm our hearts, and may even bring a moment of inspiration (the breathing in of the Spirit – "in" "spiriting").

I invite you as you enter the Sanctuary and give yourself the gift of a moment for prayer, and to consider the possibly holding conversations for coffee hour. I also invite you to maintain silence for one minute following the sermon (please stay seated until the Creed is announced).

Feel free to talk with Rev Lynne with any questions or comments about this new practice.

## St Francis' Nook

### offering glimpses of St Francis life to our day

Francis of Assisi was born 1181/1182 and died on 3 October 1226. Born to a middle class family, his father a prosperous silk merchant, his mother a noblewoman from Provence, longed to be a knight in shining armor. As a young man he was a bit of spirited youth and enjoying drinking with his companions, and being a bit of a Troubadour in his hometown of Assisi. Long story short, wounded in the war, discouraged, seeking his life path, he sought refuge on a Pilgrimage to Rome, and then lived in the caves near the rubble of the San Damiano Church. In the ruins he received a vision of Christ saying "Francis, Francis, go and repair My house which, as you can see, is falling into ruins." There began his journey and eventual founding of the Franciscan Brothers, Poor Clare Sisters, and Third Order men and women, single and married, Lay and Ordained, who live in the world according to a Rule of Life.

In the Anglican Church in England during the English Reformation all Roman Catholic Religious Orders were banished. In the mid-19<sup>th</sup> century the first Anglican sisterhoods were founded, and the Anglican Community of St Francis was founded in 1905 in the East End of London to address the needs of the poor. Anglican/Episcopal Franciscans came to the US around the same time, then disbanded, then were reestablished in the mid-1900's. The Third Order was founded in 1950. Currently there are about 200 Sisters and Friars living in convents and monasteries worldwide, and 3000 Third Order, all who live according to a Rule of Life and live under Vows.

You may be most familiar with the stories of Francis and animals, with the Blessing of Animals near his feast day of October 3<sup>rd</sup>, his Peace Prayer, "Lord, let me be an instrument of your peace...", and his reputation for hanging around gardens with animals surrounding him.

Living the life of a Franciscan is one way to deepen your spiritual life and your path of discipleship. Each newsletter will tell another piece of Francis' story and offer windows into ways you might deepen your spiritual journey.
