## Stewardship Reflections

Faith is not a static object but a journey with highs and lows and most definitely growth. Earlier this year I was involved in a business training that asked us to come up with our “word for the year”. After many long walks, conversations and prayers for guidance the word that I settled on is “blessed”. I have received so many blessings in my life including my unique talents. During times of shaky self worth I ask God to help me appreciate the gifts that He has given me as well as those of others without comparing. For a good part of my life I believed that we earned our blessings through our good works and had difficulty understanding how bad things happen to good people.

I was then challenged to think about stewardship. Giving thanks to God for all that has been given to me by sharing my time, talent and treasures to His service. Not because I have earned what I have been given but because of God's love and grace. As it states on the Episcopal Church website “Stewardship is about being grateful, responsible stewards of the gifts we receive from God. The Episcopal Church sees stewardship as more than simply contributing

money to the church; it's also about contributing time and talents, and volunteering for ministry and mission. It's about reaching out to build relationships from a perspective of abundance instead of scarcity."

## **What Does Stewardship Mean To ME**

Often when we hear the word Stewardship we think... "oh no, they want more money". Sometimes this is the case but, there are many ways you can be a good steward. We have all heard of giving the giving of your Time, Talent and Treasures. There is a balance of these three things that is right for each of us in our stewardship journey. I say journey because, at least in my case, the balance of how much each of these I give changes over time. The balance may be influenced by your income, your health, the state of your personal relationships, your relationship with the Lord and your relationship with the church to name a few. Your list may be longer or shorter but, I think you get the idea.

During the early years of my church life (small child to teenager), I had very little treasure to give. I remember allowances during those times ranging from 25 cents to \$3.00 and while I did not truly know why I gave some of that money to the church, I knew it was the right thing to do; most likely because of the example set by my parents. They often held down more than one job and money was tight but, there was always money to put in the alms basket on Sunday. During that same time period I also gave of my Time and Talents by becoming an Altar Boy (Acolyte). I felt the need to participate on a higher level and this seemed like a good way to do it.

Next came a time when I fell away from the church. Many reasons, all secular but, none-the-less 'real' to me at that time. Financial pressures were high. I remember eating spaghetti, hamburgers, pizza and hot dogs, frequently because they were inexpensive. So, no extra Treasure. With a new family, house, a job, and bills to pay, I did not think I had any spare Time to give to a church and at that time in my life I had not acquired many skills that I thought I could offer, so no Talent. Of course I realize now that this was not true. I could have easily given of my Time and Talent in many ways that cost nothing and required very little commitment but at that time, I could not see that.

My true understanding of Stewardship came when Patty and I first came to St. James. The welcoming, friendly atmosphere was something neither of us had experienced before and within a few weeks we knew we were here to stay and that God was at work in the community of St. James. St. James was truly a family of God. Being involved in the Community of St. James made me realize that this was something that needed to not only be sustained but, enabled to grow. So the first time the Stewardship campaign was rolled out I had some decisions to make. My income was higher so I pledged part of that income to the church. I truly believe that God doesn't think that the amount I now give being more financially secure is any better than the 25 cents I gave each week when I was 10 or 12 years old. Over the years as St. James and my income have grown, my contributions have increased. I think we need to re-examine what we give every once in a while. For me things like moving our priest from ¼ time to ½ time, and then to ¾ time, the Undercroft Renovation, Roof Repairs, etc. were all times when I took a look at what we were giving to St. James on a monetary basis. Most recently, when the Vestry made the Decision to call Lynne to be our full-time priest, I once again looked at what Patty and I were giving. A couple of weeks prior to this decision, I probably would have said, "I'm giving all I can" but, when I considered the what the impact of having Lynne here more will have on the St. James Family and what it may mean for our taking the works and teachings of Jesus out into the community, I once again increased our pledge. So my plea to you is 1) give whatever you think you are able to 2) reassess what you give periodically (maybe each time you get a raise at work or based on something going on at the church), and regardless of the amount you give of your Treasures, don't forget to give of your Time and Talent too.

Being a "jack of all trades" I soon found a niche at St. James helping out with maintenance and construction projects, I reprised my role as an Acolyte and took it one step further becoming a Chalice Assistant. I would encourage everyone who may be interested to try these roles; whether you are young or old. Remember if an 8 year old boy can learn to be an Altar Boy, anyone can do it. Each one of us has at least one unique talent and what a shame it will be if it is not shared with others. Talent can also be given in an endless list of other areas such as music, writing, cleaning, helping out with the dinners and bazaars, mowing lawns, being on the Altar Guild. If there is something you would like to try, please speak with Lynne. Remember, if you try it and do not like it, you can always try something else.

When it comes to time, this may be the easiest thing to give to our St. James Family. If you are one of those folks that say: "I don't have any real talents"; number one I beg to differ because there are a whole host of things that we can use your help with. Many times just having an extra person around at an event can be priceless. So I encourage you to seek out way in which you can donate your time to keep the good work of St. James going.

So to summarize, Stewardship is a journey that changes based on where you are in life, how much you can give (Treasure), what you have to give (Time and Talent), and where you are in your relationship with God. So I ask you to reflect on your life, determine where you are, where you can contribute to all or any of the good things that we do at St. James and remember \$3.00 is as good as \$300.00 and 15 minutes is as good as 2 hours, and your talents may not be the same as someone else's but, they are all unique to you and we would love to have you share them with us.

Thanks for listening to the story of my Stewardship Journey and I hope you can join me on this journey as part of the St. James family so we can continue to use our church as a base from which we can continue to reach out to the greater community to do great things Jesus has asked us to do.

### **Food Pantry**

In the early 1980's a parishioner of St. James, Joan Smith, became concerned about the effect of the economy on the less well-off segment of the Hammondsport area population. While St. James could not change the economy, we could help alleviate some of the hunger in our area and so she proposed opening a food pantry in our church building that would be supplied by donations of food and of money. So Loaves and Fishes Food Pantry was opened. Although it started out as a St. James project, and we continued to house it in our church, it soon became an ecumenical project for the churches of Hammondsport with staffing and contributions from the various churches as well as contributions from the Hammondsport community.

For many years the pantry was housed in a small closet in a hall off the Keeler room in the undercroft, but as more families were serviced and as more food became available through a connection to the Food Bank of the Southern Tier, it eventually outgrew that small space. After the latest round of renovations during 2009-2010 the pantry was relocated to our only Sunday School room. All the cupboards in that room were used to store food and garage type locking doors were installed on the fronts of the cupboards. The pantry refrigerator and freezer were also re-located to that room. To access the food pantry the former outside cellar door was expanded to house a covered entry, but those stairs remained the primary source of entry for clients and food deliveries alike.

### **Food Pantry, part two**

Last year the Vestry expressed some concerns about the Food Pantry at St James and entered a dialogue about the steep stairs, the lack of parking, the number of times a month the Pantry is open, as well as insurance coverage since they became a separate non-profit agency (501.c.3). This year, with our growing number of infants and children, and our need for flexible space, we have asked the Pantry to find other accommodations by September 1<sup>st</sup>, while assuring the leadership that we would continue to offer our support, time, talent, and treasure to this vital community organization.

Please keep the Loaves and Fishes Food Pantry in your prayers as they seek new housing that includes parking, easy access for people with mobility issues, and a friendly landlord.

We will have two adults in the Sunday School room, and will add a third adult if there are children under the age of 5 in the class. Please see Rev Lynne or Lin if you would like to volunteer to assist in the classroom.

In the months ahead we hope to create a play space for our babies and toddlers, as well as a quiet space for (grand)parents with these little ones to who need to roam, rest, or recreate. We also hope to build on our programs for middlers (grades 6-8) and high school youth.
