## **From the Rector's Corner**

*We know that all things work together for good for those who love God,  
who are called according to his purpose. (Romans 8:28)*

Hurricane Harvey has brought record-breaking water and damage to the people of Houston and surrounding areas. As we continue to listen day-to-day about the destruction and the efforts to rebuild, our thoughts turn in many directions. How can we help? Why did this happen? Is this from God? We think back over the disasters of our lifetime, and wonder about all who were impacted, and all who are saved.

The folks who attend Bible Study have been remarking how the Prophet Isaiah could be speaking to us today. God, speaking through the prophet, is bringing evidence against the people, charging that they have repeatedly and consistently broken the covenant. He begins with how we have made idols of wealth and power, how we turn to silver and gold to show our worth. Isaiah continues in the next chapter with how we rely on people with power; and how the haughty and arrogant will be humiliated. This week Isaiah continues with the sins of: greed, self-indulgence, cynicism, moral perversion, and social injustice. All of these idols cause us to falsely rely on ourselves and our possessions to keep us safe, when in reality, it can be taken away in a moment.

And at the same time, throughout the book of Isaiah, God keeps offering the people his undying love, and speaks of his woe and regret at their unwillingness to turn to him and honor their part of the covenant. God repeatedly speaks of the ways he will tend and care for his people any time they turn to him.

For the last few weeks I have been preaching about our relationship with God. How do we slow down and listen (aside from the flashing lights in our rearview mirror)? Do we, like Peter, pay attention to our fear of the waves and wind, or do we call out to Jesus, trusting that he will immediately take our hand and pull us to safety. Can we follow the example of Jesus with the Canaanite woman, whose daughter he initially compares to a dog, and then reveals a transformed heart and brings healing to the "other"?

In other words, in times of uncertainty, when we experience life's ups and downs, trials and tribulations, where do we turn? We know that we were never promised a rose garden; but we are offered a closer walk with God who has the power to save. The Creator who loves us deeply, as His own beloved children, has called us and continues to call us to turn to him. His grace and mercy are enough to sustain us, and to bring us always to a place of shelter.

I invite you to consider making a donation to Episcopal Relief and Development to assist the victims of Hurricane Harvey. And second, to make time each day to turn to God and listen for his plans for you.

### **Stained Glass Windows** **See how far we have come!**

St James has thirty-four windows in need of care and protection. Some, like the two of Jesus are instantly visible, others can only be seen up in the tower, or in the side rooms and stairwells. The restoration process includes removing the paint from the exterior wooden frames, cleaning and glazing the windows, repairing cracked or broken pieces, and reinforcing the windows where the lead is sagging. The windows will then be covered with a special clear coated protective glass. Our total cost is going to be around \$34,000 and the Vestry has agreed to pay 50% from the building fund. Amazingly, through the “adopt-a-window campaign,” and associated donations, St James is very close to raising the other fifty percent. Thank you, St James!

Willet Hauser, now part of Associate Crafts, has contracted to begin the work in the Spring. We are still working out the start date, that will be dependent on the weather. Once they begin the work, they work six days a week to get it done. They will, of course, work around weddings and funerals.

### **Sunday School**

Join us every Sunday morning, week in and week out, for Sunday School. All ages welcome! We are now using the curriculum, “Seasons of the Spirit” for multiage groups which using the lectionary readings of the day with a wide variety of craft activities to enhance learning. Join Gladys Palmer, the Sunday School teacher, and her weekly assistant for this Bible based music, stories, and fun!

### **Backpack Program**

Many thanks to you all for helping to collect, pack, and distribute backpacks and school supplies to more than 48 Hammondspont School students. This is a great way for us to show our support to our children and youth as they return for another academic year. We are happy to partner with the neighboring churches and Catholic Charities to create a service to families who need some assistance in preparing for the upcoming school year. The excess materials were taken to the school to be distributed as the need arises. Thank you!

### **Altar Flowers**

Each week we have flowers on the high altar in thanksgiving, or in memory of a loved one. If you would like to donate flowers, simply sign up on the Flower Calendar in the Parish Hall, then complete the information on the envelope and place it in the plate, or give the envelope to an usher. We ask a donation of \$25 to cover the cost of the weekly flowers.

### **Loaves and Fishes Food Pantry**

The Pantry gives thanks for the weekly basket of food and other items. They would like to remind us that cleaning products, and hygiene products (toothpaste, deodorant...) are always needed as well as the food items.

### Funeral Planning and Planned Giving

It is often following a burial service that we each begin to think about our affairs. Did you know that you could sit with Rev Lynne and plan your funeral service? You will be given time on your own to consider readings and hymn choices; communion or not, Rite I or Rite II, readers, pall bearers. You can decide which, if any, family and friends you would like to have say a few words at the service. You can start to make decisions about cremation or coffin, burial or scattering, and the time and place for that to happen before or after the funeral or memorial service. It is a lovely gift for your family to know exactly what you want when the time comes. While you are considering your affairs we also invite you to consider leaving a gift to the church, either in the form of an item, such as a window, chalice, or linens, or a monetary gift. ### Garbage & Snow Removal – Are you being called?

We give thanks to Mary White who gathers and removes our garbage week after week. As Mary hopes to spend the winter in Florida, it is time to find another person who is willing to offer this gift. You collect the garbage from kitchen and baths on Monday afternoon and take them to the curb. On Tuesday morning, if possible, you return the can to the kitchen and put in a new bag. Simple, right? We also seek someone to remove snow from our sidewalk and steps. Again, simple. If we get more than 2 inches that sticks past 10 a.m. could you shovel, snow blow, and salt? The most important time is early on Sunday mornings, preferably by 7:30 a.m. so the ice melt has a chance to work before we gather. Are you willing? Or do you know someone (a teen) who might be interested at a modest price?

### Stewardship Story: Between Giving and Receiving

A young person wanted to be on fire for the Lord. She was trying many things and going to many places. More than anything she wanted to experience the peace that surpasses all understanding. She went to a host of differing worship services, spoke with several pastors, scoured YouTube, and even read a few books.

There remained within her spirit a lingering doubt: a fear that there was more she wasn't getting. She went to a Pentecostal worship service and pretended to speak in tongues, and then felt guilty for weeks. She fasted and prayed. One day she merely sat and waited for God to show up, and it was a very long day indeed. Not far from her house was a rather small and not so well-kept church. She had seen the elderly pastor walk by her house on his way to this church, where despite his age he still preached every Sunday and led a weekly Bible study group.

One day as he was walking by, he looked up and noticed the young woman sitting on her porch. He recognized the worried look. "What is troubling you, my dear?" he asked. And out poured all her worries and fears and doubts. With tears wetting her face, she cried out, "I just don't think I am getting all I can from God." The old pastor smiled and said, "The answer to your problems is quite simple, very simple indeed. The secret to faith is not what you get from God. It is in what you give."
