## **From the Rector's Corner**

## **I Probably have a Video on That Jerry Lange Nov 2017**

Around 2009 a talk was given in Penn Yan about the Garrett Winery which started in 1903 in North Carolina and eventually moved to Penn Yan in 1912 because of probaton laws in North Carolina and Virginia. At the time, they were the largest winery in the country.

The talk was given by one of the Garrett family. A once in a lifetime talk. And it wasn't recorded, lost for ever. That irritated me to no end, missing a chance for a wonderful addition to the local historical records.

I had a cheap cassette recorder and tried to record another talk shortly after. But the quality was terrible. Being a Kodak retiree, knowing photography and audio, and having a degree in physics I decided that I could do something about this.

My brother-in-law had a decent small video cassette camcorder that he wanted to sell so I bought it and started recording some talks. One was a reenactment of a speech by Fredrick Douglass, very cool! I was giving a DVD of the few speeches I had videoed to a few local historical societies.

The quality was fair but it took multiple tapes to record a talk. That interrupted the recordings so I bought a small video camera that recorded on a digital card that could hold several hours of video with much better quality. I also bought a professional video editing program which made me buy a more powerful computer. I started giving copies of the DVD's to all the local historical societies and historians.

But the sound wasn't very good. So I bought a good quality portable voice recorder and microphone, which was also used to record Cecil VanHouten playing the piano in church. But I also wanted to record Elly playing the organ but the quality wasn't good from across the room. I bought a twin to the first recorder for the organ recordings and solved the problem. It also comes in very handy when recording a talk given by two people.

Most talks are given with PowerPoint slide shows on a projection screen. Often with the lights off. The little video camera didn't do a very good job of capturing the speaker in the dark. By this time I had started giving copies to most of the public libraries in the area. That brings me up to 15 to 18 DVDs for each talk. I also record the monthly talks by the Finger Lakes Boating Museum.

A semi-pro video camera that is very sensitive in the dark solved the PowerPoint darkness problem. This had the added advantage of being able to have the small camera aimed at the projection screen so I know what slide was being projected while using the big video camera to record the speaker. A modification to the tripod allowed it to hold the two cameras.

This year alone I'll have done 24 videos, I estimate I've given out over 900 DVDs since starting this. At no charge. The pay is the smiles and thank you's when delivering the DVDs.

Do a card catalog search at any of the libraries in the area on my name, Jerry Lange, and you'll see a wealth of topics you can check out, around 60 DVDs, ranging from what's on the bottom of the Keuka Lake to how to care for your fine glassware to the history of the lightning sailboat to the dedication of a local cemetery where a Revolutionary War hero is buried.

This area is blessed to have so many skilled people that take the time and effort to do these talks covering so many interesting subjects. My small part allows the talks to be seen and heard for those that didn't go to the live presentation and preserves them for future generations.

**Jim Grillo**  
**Alfred State President's Medallion**  
**November 4, 2017**

SUNY Distinguished Teaching Professor Jim Grillo was honored with the Alfred State President's Medallion Saturday, Nov. 4, at the Alfred State Lake Lodge.

The President's Medallion was instituted in 2008 and is awarded to those who have made outstanding contributions to Alfred State. The college recognizes and commemorates the efforts of supporters and advocates dedicated to the mission of Alfred State.

From 1967 to 1968, Grillo fought in Vietnam as part of a Marine Recon unit, having been wounded three times and earning three Purple Hearts, with duties ranging from infantry machine gunner to platoon sergeant. He returned to the US in 1968, having been forced to retire from the military because of the wounds he received in combat.

Following his service in the Marines, Grillo returned to college, receiving two degrees from Alfred University: a Bachelor of Science in business administration in 1971 and a Master of Science in counseling and guidance in 1972. The latter year, he also took his first job at Alfred State as a residence hall director of Robinson/Champlin Hall.

In 1973, Grillo became a counselor in the Admissions Office. He quickly rose through the ranks, becoming the assistant director of Admissions three years later, and then the dean of Admissions, Records, and Financial Aid in 1978, a position he would hold until 1989.

That year, Grillo joined the Business Department as an associate professor, becoming department chair in 1993, a position he held until 1999. He then served as the dean of the School of Management and Engineering Technology for less than a year until he was named the dean of Marketing and Enrollment Management in November of 1999.

A year and a half later, Grillo became the vice president for Marketing and Enrollment Management., and then vice president for Administration and Enrollment Management. He rejoined the Business Department faculty in 2005, where he has remained ever since. He also served a total of eight years as Faculty Senate chair.

Throughout his career at Alfred State, Grillo has received a number of significant honors and awards, including the Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Professional Service in 1980, the Business Teacher of the Year Alumni Award in 1992 and 1993, being recognized among the Who's Who In Teaching in 1996, and being named a SUNY Distinguished Teaching Professor in 2007.

At the end of the 2017-2018 school year, Grillo is retiring after 46 years of working at Alfred State. Looking back on his outstanding career, Grillo noted he wouldn't change a thing and that he has loved every minute he has worked at the college.
