

It is my experience that an artist is rarely completely satisfied with their work. Like many of us, they seem to see every flaw in their art and are unable to step back and see the beauty that is right before them. They are too close to what they have made to be objective.

It is the same reason some of us are overly critical of ourselves. The remedy for this spiritual *dis-ease* lies within our Christian faith. Christianity offers us the opportunity to live our lives on a deeper level. It offers us the chance to live beyond our thirst for recognition, prestige, power, and success.

When faith frees our mind, we will begin to thirst for God. As Joyce Rupp in her book <u>The Cup of Our life</u> points out, this is the moment in which we begin to search for peace of mind, healing of our wounds, and greater acceptance of ourselves.

In our search for something greater than ourselves, God may take the form of discovery of who we truly are, harmony with our families or freedom from the false messages of our minds. All these activities are means for us to look more deeply into our lives and see the nature, the quality, and the intensity of our thirsts.

In the end, we will discover that when we see ourselves through the eyes of Christ, the eyes of compassion and love, we will see ourselves as the beautiful artistry of God.

This experience of seeing ourselves through Christ's eyes reveals to us the beauty within us that has always been there from our beginning. A beauty that can never be taken away from us.



Holy, Holy, Holy

Author – Reginald Heber, 1783-1826 Composer – John B. Dykes, 1823 - 1876

Tune Name – 'Nicaeea'

Scripture Reference: Revelations 4:8-11

Reginald Heber was born in England on April 21 1783 to scholarly and well-to-do parents. At the age of seventeen he entered Oxford University. The Hymn, Holy, Holy, Holy was written specifically for use on Trinity Sunday. The emphasis of this Sunday's service is to reaffirm the doctrine of the triune Godhead. Though the word "trinity" is not found in the Scriptures, it is clearly taught through God's Word.

The tune of this text has been named "Nicaea." It was named after the Council of Nicaea held in Asia Minor in 325 A.D., when the doctrine of the Trinity was examined and held to be a true and essential doctrine of the Christian faith.

From Lesser Feasts and Fasts

Mother of Augustine of Hippo



Monnica's life story is enshrined in the spiritual autobiography of her eldest son, in *The Confession of Saint Augustine*. Born in North Africa about 331, Monnica was married to a Latinized provincial named Patricus, whom she won to the Christian faith before his death.

Her ambition for her gifted son was transformed into a passionate desire for his conversion to Christ. After his baptism in Milan in 387, by Bishop Ambrose, Augustine and his mother, together with his younger brother, planned to return home to Africa. While awaiting ship at Ostia, the port of Rome, Monnica fell ill.

Augustine writes, "One day during her illness she had a fainting spell and lost consciousness for a short time. We hurried to her bedside, but she soon regained consciousness and looked up at my brother and me as we stood beside her, with a puzzled look, she asked, "Where was I? Then, watching us closely as we stood there speechless with grief, she said, "You will bury your mother here."

Recent excavations at Ostia have uncovered her original tomb. Her mortal remains, however, were transferred in 1430 to the Church of St, Augustine in Rome.

Let Us Pray: O Lord, through spiritual discipline you strengthened your servant Monnica to preserve in offering her love and prayers and tears for the conversion of her husband and of Augustine their son: Deepen our devotion, we pray, and use us in accordance with your will to bring others, even our own kindred, to acknowledge Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord; who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.
