


From St. James' With Love September 2024 Newsletter

Tell me about the Safe House in Bath

The Safe House in Bath is a five-bedroom (with its own bathroom) facility with a capacity of 14 clients for victims of domestic abuse. It has a living room, dining room and Kitchen with a playroom for little ones. The state determined that clients may stay up to 90 days, but the Director says that finding safe, affordable housing is an issue so they can stay longer with approval from the state. The clients are primarily from Steuben County, but they will accept anyone from anywhere, even other countries. They arrive by any means available: car, bus, taxi, law enforcement etc. The facility is staffed 24/7 and there is an advocate on staff who can connect them with social services. The clients prepare their own breakfast and lunch, and the staff prepares the evening meal... The State has food guidelines as to what can be provided which the staff purchases. There are no regular donators except Corning, Inc. which donates once a year. Other organizations donate sporadically. The Director is very appreciative of the donations from St. James (quarterly). Currently the Fall 2024 needs are shampoo and conditioner, deodorant, body wash, towels and large diapers.

MISSION COMMITTEE

- 1. Fr Craig has coordinated with the manager of the Senior apartments so St James has been able to help two individuals who live there from the discretionary fund.
- 2. Carol Israel (Aging in Place has planned an activity for September 18, 4-8 PM at St. James.
- 3. Mission Committee will give \$500 for flood relief (to be matched by the vestry. The congregation raised nearly \$5,000 in relief funds.
- 4. Mary proposed a before school haircut program modeled after Christ Church's in Corning. All were in favor but the time was too short to organize it this year.
- 5. The committee finalized a written proposal to the vestry to add a line item for Mission and Outreach to next year's annual budget.

Hildegard of Bingen

Feast Day

17 September



Hildegard of Bingen, born in 1098 in the lush Rhineland Valley, was a mystic, poet, composer, dramatist, doctor and scientist. Her parents' tenth child, she was tithed to the Church and raised by the anchoress Jutta in a cottage near the Benedictine monastery of Disibodenberg.

Hildegard lived in a world accustomed to male governance. Yet, within her convents and to surprising extent outside them, she exercised a commanding spiritual authority based on confidence in her visions and considerable political astuteness. When she died in 1179 at 81, she left a rich legacy which speaks eloquently across the ages.



Food Prices and Trends Opinion article By Father Craig

Have you been to the grocery store lately? Prices certainly have risen sharply over the last year or so. In fact, USDA data indicates from 2021 to 2022 there was about a 11 percent increase.

Weather Many factors have affected our food supply chain and the accordingly dramatic price increase in food. One such long term factor is our changing weather. Many of us do not realize that our Midwest has been suffering from multiple years of drought and we also do not realize how that drought is affecting food production.

The Russian-Ukraine conflict affected the global supply of agricultural commodities. Russia and Ukraine are significant producers and exporters of several commodities, including wheat, corn, sunflower oil and fertilizer. The conflict has caused reductions of global wheat supplies that, coupled with already reduced wheat supplies in the U.S. due to drought led to increases in U.S. wheat prices.

Effects of COVID-19 pandemic caused disruptions across multiple segments of the food supply chain that may have affected food prices. For example, the pandemic reduced the availability of labor, such as truck drivers, which contributed to transportation bottlenecks. The pandemic also led to slowdowns in meat processing as workers became sick and plants shut down

Animal and plant disease outbreaks affect the production of segments of our food supply. The Highly Pathogen Avian Influenza virus outbreak in 2022 and 2023 reduced the supply of poultry and eggs when millions of turkeys and laying hens were euthanized after exposure to the virus. According to the USDA December 2022 wholescale egg prices were the highest ever recorded---averaging about \$5 per dozen, over 200 percent higher than December 2021

Citrus greening---an insect-borne plant disease that impairs a tree's ability to produce fruit and eventually kills it—has reduced citrus yields in multiple states since it reached the US in 2005. Increased production costs and decrease supply could have led to higher prices for consumers, according to USDA experts.

In summary I have identified only four factors that that continue to affect the price we pay for food at the grocery store. Others not covered in this article include the increased cost of animal feed, higher energy costs, rising food processor and manufacturer costs. The costs that these industries incur account for a substantial proportion of retail food prices. For example, food processing costs made up about 25 cents of every dollar a consumer spent on food at the grocery store in 2021.

In conclusion, weather, drought, the Ukraine and Russia conflict, labor shortages and costs, as well as, insect borne plant disease have affected our nation's ability to produce inexpensive food.

As a tag to this article, it is not uncommon for some families to spend over 30% of their income on food alone. After these families pay for food very little income is left to pay for rent, electric or heat.
