And it's a wrap! Community Vacation Bible School 2019 was a huge success thanks to the participation of all the area churches and especially the Hammondsport United Methodist Church for hosting. An average of 55 students from grades pre-k to 6<sup>th</sup> grade participated daily along with 14 fabulous teen helpers. In total there were 41 volunteers that contributed their time and talents in so many ways – registration, kitchen help, general supervision, clerical work, teachers – the list is endless.

Every day started with an opening assembly including a skit, joyful music with hand motions, the daily Bible point and key verse and prayer. Each grade level group then rotated through different stations including snack (Hungry Herd Café), science and crafts (Imagination Station), recreation (Stampede Sports), crew time to pray and discuss the day's lesson and watch a brief video (KidVid Cinema and Wild Bible Adventures). The day ended by gathering together to sing, pray and review the day's lesson.
