Senior Warden Report – submitted by Mary White

From your “more absent than present” outgoing Senior Warden. The generosity and compassion of the people of St. James continues to be a wonderful witness to our mission. I love and miss you all! The following happened during 2017:

- We called Rev. Lynne to be our full time Rector
- Backpack program- 46 backpacks were distributed to students through a coordinated effort of the local churches. Excess supplies were given to the school to be distributed as needed.
- As a spin-off from the backpack distribution we were able to help an unexpectedly expanded family with school clothes for their 6 children.
- The Giving Tree solicited generous donations of gifts for 4 high school students as well as well over 300 much needed personal care items for the Food Pantry.
- St. James contributed to and participated in Vacation Bible School, Paul and the Underground Church. 75 children, 25 youth and 50 adults participated.
- Work on “The Episcopal Church Welcomes You” signage is on hold until Spring. Receiving permission from individual property owners is still needed.
- St. James participated in the Earth Day Fair in the Village Square, taking prayer requests and handing out reusable grocery bags.
- We worked to increase our social media presence through the St. James Facebook and Instagram pages.
- A number of St. James parishioners accompanied Rev. Lynn on a Pilgrimage to the Holy Land in May 2017.
- The Sunday School room was beautifully renovated. A wall was constructed to separate Rev. Lynne’s office from the sacristy for heating and privacy purposes.
- We hosted Senior Potluck lunches.
- A stunning cathedral window quilt was created by a group of church women. Rev. Lynne organized a Quilt Show for the community. The raffle of the quilt as

well as proceeds from the bake sale were contributed to the stained-glass window protection fund.

- We took a break from the Apple Pie Sale and made other commitments to fund mission.

Buildings and Grounds – submitted by Nick Forenz

Buildings and Grounds project were numerous in 2017. The major projects are listed below followed by some of the day to day efforts that many members of the congregation take on every day to help keep the church building and its surround grounds in good shape.

New Heat/AC in Office:

A new combination heat/air conditioning unit was installed in the office.

Dean Frey Sunday School Room Remodel:

Following the move of the food pantry to St. Gabriel's, the food pantry closets were removed and the room was enlarged to by expanding into the space formerly taken up by those closets. Walls were sheet rocked and painted, floor tile was patched, new blinds were hung on the storage closet and the walls and ceiling was repainted. LED lights were installed to make the room brighter and a new rug, felt board set, and tables and chairs were donated to complete the effort.

New Cabinets in Kitchen:

Four new cabinets were added to the kitchen to increase storage space especially for larger objects and all of the cabinets have been labeled so items can be easily located.

Stained Glass Window Project:

The Vestry designated a portion of money to refurbish and protect the stained glass windows. A grant was received form the Fred and Harriette Taylor Foundation for another portion of the refurbishment. This still left a significant amount of money to be raised in order to make the project a reality. Members of the congregation signed up to adopt a window or to pool their money with others to adopt a window and the balance of the money was quickly raised. The plan was for the repair, cleaning and placement of protective, non-yellowing antioxidant-UV stabilized polymer sheets over the windows, held in place with Aluminum frames to be done in 2018. The company doing the work contacted St. James in early November and the work began just before Thanksgiving. The windows look brand new again and we no longer have to worry about damage from foreign objects impacting them from the outside. We believe we may even be seeing

some benefits in out heating costs due to the increase insulation value of the cover sheets.

Office Remodel:

The stairway in the office was closed off and a door installed at the bottom of the Sacristy stairs in order to provide some privacy for Rev. Lynne when she is holding a counseling sessions and it also is serving to help hold the heat in the office rather than having is just flow up the stairway into the Sacristy

As is the case every year we did our usual share of yearly maintenance that keeps the church looking good and operating safely.

- Ruts in the lawn were filled in and new grass was planted
- Spring clean-up and bush trimming work day
- Lawn mowing
- Trash removal
- Snow Removal
- Outdoor flower upkeep
- Light bulb changing
- Fixing a loose or broken something
- Making sure the TVs, sound system and cameras are working

To this list, as always, we can add the things that get done that no one is aware of because someone steps up and takes care of them before anyone else takes notice. Many thanks, to all our solicited and unsolicited volunteers. We all appreciate your efforts to keep the church in good repair, and looking great.

We have several projects on our "To Do" list - some of which we will tackle in 2018:

- Repair or replace the Tower Door
- Install new ceiling and lighting in the Sacristy
- Clean/shampoo the carpets and chairs in the Undercroft
- Paint the walls in the Flora Keeler room
- Put of a fireproof backsplash behind the new stove
- Install an Ansul Fire Suppression System in the kitchen
- Reconnect Sacristy Drain to dry well
- Repair ruts in front lawn (new ones 😊)

So, as you can see 2017 was another busy year from a maintenance and grounds-keeping perspective with a lot being accomplished by a relatively small volunteer workforce. As we check items off the list we continue add new ones and we are confident that people with the appropriate talents will continue to step forward to help whittle down the 2018 list.

Thanks again to all who do their part. We would not be able to operate this building without your efforts.

South East Diocesan Delegate Report – submitted by Luanne Graulich

Diocesan Delegates from St. James Episcopal Church attend the meetings of the Southeast District of the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester, these district meetings are held four times a year. Our Delegates are Gladys Palmer, Charlie Skinner and Luanne Graulich.

These meetings discuss resolutions that will be presented to the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester at their annual Convention. Budget proposals are discussed as well as a general overview of the budget for the upcoming year. Reports on the State of the Diocese, as well as guest speakers may be on the agenda. The 86th Convention of

the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester was held on October 28, 2017 at Rochester Institute of Technology. The meeting was chaired by Bishop Prince Singh.

A vote to bring the South Wedge Mission into the Rochester Diocese passed. The main address to the convention was given by Bishop Singh. He told us the Rochester Diocese grew by 1.3% last year. He said many accept the decline in membership as normal - but not us. His talk focused on Leadership, Relationships and Stewardship.

A presentation was given by Alan Ziegler of Rochester, "A Conversation on Race." Racial reconciliation and healing was the theme of their presentation. It was very enlightening as well as inspiring.

- *Adult Faith Formation* (Lynne Sharp)
 - Bible Study met most Mondays (except holidays) at 4:00. This year we focused on reading through the book of Romans with the help of N. T. Wright's study guide, and are now working our way through the Prophet Isaiah.
 - The Book Group met the first and third Monday of the month at 5:30 and we are working our way through the Book of Common Prayer.
 - The Lenten study read through portions of the Gospel of Matthew. Each week we looked at different themes within the Gospel and have a brief Bible study using one of the readings. We had time to engage the Scripture, enter into discussion, and ask questions.
 - The Advent Study, held on Tuesday evenings at 7:00 was entitled "Watching and Waiting" and told some of the stories of our faith about those who watch and wait, while looking at how we watch and wait in our daily lives. This Advent education included a mixture of prayer, Scripture, music, readings, and discussion.

- *Sunday School* (Lynne Sharp) –We initiated a new curriculum this year, “Seasons of the Spirit” which is a lectionary based curriculum which offers an outline for the day, background information for the teacher(s), a variety of activities which speak to different learning styles. St James purchased the multi-age program which is effective for young learners age 5-11/12. Seasons of the Spirit also includes music CD’s for each season of the year. We give thanks that Gladys Palmer has agreed to be our Sunday School teacher. Gladys comes with many years’ experience working with both children and youth. We also give thanks to the faithful and helpful volunteers who give their time every few weeks to assist in the classroom. - *Youth Group*, Hammondsport Community (Lynne Sharp) St. James has supported the Hammondsport Community Youth Group this year. The youth group meets once a month from September through to May alternating between the Methodist Church and St James for students in Grades 7-12. Attendance ranges from 7-20 young people; some who attend area churches and many who do not attend regular services. We give thanks to Karen and Jim Derr who coordinated the food through the 2017 year, and the many folks of St James who also offered snacks. We thank Tom Bidwell for his musical direction with the youth. Youth Group includes a dinner – a huge thanks goes out to Karen and Jim for coordinating, and the many helpers who made our youth dinners a success. This year we have averaged 20 students per gathering.

Minutes from the Annual Meeting of January 29, 2017

At 9:00 AM Rev. Lynne called the meeting to order with prayer.

Karen Derr introduced the following nominees to the vestry: Jim Grillo for junior warden, Jimmy Nichiporuk, Leah Nichiporuk and Tom Pietch.

As there were no nominatons from the floor, Gregg Learned moved, seconded by Charlie Skinner to close the nominations.

Nick Forenz moved to elect by acclamation the slate of nominees to the vestry, seconded by Jerry Lange. Carried.

The Rector's Report was included in Rev. Lynne's sermon. (see attached)

Jim Grillo moved to accept the minutes for the 2016 Annual meeting, seconded by Gladys Palmer.

Karen Derr presented the Treasurer's report and the 2017 budget for St. James. It was noted that there was an increase in the anticipated plate offering, a 25% increase in pledges and an expected decrease in electricity due to the Food Pantry's relocation, as well as an increase in clergy salary because of Rev. Lynne's call to full time.

There has been a 4.3% increase in St. James financial assets.

There was no response to the attached committee reports, therefore Charlie Skinner moved to accept the committee reports, seconded by Jim Piersons. Carried.

Jim Piersons moved to adjourn the meeting, seconded by Bill Torp. Carried.
