

Mission Committee: The Mission Committee is comprised of Leah Nichiporuk, Luanne Graulich, Kris Packard, Janetmarie Skinner, Donna Noteware, Mary White and Carol Bidwell. We have been quick to respond to local, national and international catastrophes and needs.

The Mission Committee will be filling nine physical shoeboxes this year and our "wow" gift will be Shoes that Grow. They can be seen on the black table in the Undercroft. We are again setting a goal of 50 total shoeboxes: 15 physical boxes and 35 online. The online method was quite popular with our congregation last year. It can be accessed via our website (StJames14840.org, click upcoming events, click build a shoebox). Collection dates at the distribution center in Avoca are November 13-20. All St. James shoeboxes should be at the church or purchased online by November 19. We are continuing to supply hygiene products for the Safe House in Bath initiated by Gail Osborn. We are collecting shampoo, conditioner, hairbrushes, deodorant and they indicated, if possible, S-M-L sweatpants and tops would be welcome. Items will be delivered about November 20.

We anticipate continuing the "Angel Tree" project where slips of paper with needed items for the Food Pantry would be available, and when chosen, an angel would be put on the Christmas Tree. If any parishioner knows of a need or organization that may need some help, please notify one of the committee members, or put it on a slip of paper in the black fabric basket on the table in the Undercroft. Our ability to help depends on funds available.

It's that time again! Esther Covell has graciously taken charge of our annual "Socks for the Veteran's Administration" again. In the past, the VA has asked for white socks only, but now will accept colored socks as well. We will have baskets placed at the Usher's stand for your contribution. Hymn Stories

"Abide with Me" Author-Henry F. Lyte Composer-William H. Monk Scripture reference-Luke 24:29

Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: For Thou art with me; Thy rod and Thy staff they comfort me. Psalm 23:4

It has been stated that only the person who can face the prospect of death realistically is able to live this life with purpose and confidence. Such was the conviction of a rather obscure English pastor, Henry F Lyte, when he wrote the text for this hymn in 1847. Shortly before his own home-going. It has since become one of the favorite hymns for Christians everywhere during times of sorrow and deep distress.

Henry F. Lyte was born in Scotland on June 1, 1793. Throughout his lifetime he was known as a man threated by asthma and tuberculosis. Despite his physical frailties he was a tireless worker with an established reputation as a poet, musician and minister. It was he who coined the phrase, "It is better to wear out than to rust out."

His text for this hymn was taken from the account of Christ's appearance with the two disciples on the way to Emmaus and their statement, "Abide with us: for it is toward the evening and the day is far spent" (Luke 24:29). Lyte also wrote "Jesus, I My Cross Have Taken."

From the spiritual diary of Father Craig

In the setting of the Hymn "How Firm a Foundation" we sing these words.

Fear not, I am with you, O be not dismayed; For I am your God, and will still give you aid; I'll strengthen you, help you, and cause you to stand Upheld by my righteous, omnipotent hand.

It is striking that in this hymn God speaks directly to us, and reminds us not to be fearful for He is with us. In this hymn we are reminded Christ always is present. However, ironically Christ often is not seen by us. This is especially true when we experience disappointments, fears or depression. A regular prayer life has the ability to assist in mediating the effects of these conditions. I believe it is in our traditional prayer practices that we can experience the real presence of Christ at the core of our very Being. This experience of Christ within us has the potential to cause healthy and dramatic mental and emotional paradigm shifts. Many forms of prayer require us to practice relaxing, mindlessness, and rhythmic breathing. I am recommending that each of us spend time praying in Christ's spirit to support our healthy living.
