This past Saturday, December 2nd, we held a Christmas Bazaar from 10-4 in the undercroft. Our bazaar featured many handmade items and other Christmas decorations. This bazaar will raise much needed money for Mission.

A dedicated group of volunteers worked to make this event a success. We met one Thursday per month since September to work together on craft items as well as working on items at home for the bazaar.

We also had many people helping us to set up the bazaar and price the items as well as people working the day of the bazaar as sales clerks and cashier.

Sales will continue during coffee hour from now till Christmas. If you shop with us you will find great gifts to give and the money will all go to a good cause which makes it a win/win situation.

Thank you to all who worked to make it a success and all who shopped with us. As of the end of the day Saturday we have made \$1,250.00.



We have completed all the buying and stacking of Christmas box goodies. Now comes the fun part, packing and distribution! We pack boxes on Thursday, December 7, and they are distributed on Friday and Saturday, December 8 and 9, from 9 am – 1pm. The Women's Club of Hammondsport will give out \$125 gift cards to the Hammondsport Grocery. They have also bought clothing and gifts for some of the families in Hammondsport School. High School teens will again help with the lifting and carrying of boxes up the stairs.

With December taken care of, we are already looking towards starting a new project in January. We will be giving 'pantry shopping lists' to all residents of the Senior Housing at 41 Lake Street. The residents will make their selections, and with the help of student teens from school, we will fill their orders and distribute boxes right to their doors. We will be doing this on the 1 st Saturday of every month. It will take a little trial and error to iron out the logistics, but I think it will be a successful program. Many thanks to Amanda Smith and the management company of Arbor Development who will assist us with this project.

What is the Season of Advent?

The four Sundays before Christmas is a Church season to be used as a time of preparation and light reflection. The Latin would *adventus* means "coming." The First Sunday in Advent is the beginning of the Church year. Advent and Lent have some similarities. They are both times of preparation, repentance and renewed commitment. There are also great differences between the two. The background of Advent is the Kingdom of God is at hand. One prepares for the presence of a great King, and when Advent is over, we confront the child in the manger. Advent asks us to spiritually move from waiting in anticipation for a great powerful king to arrive only to meet the baby Jesus resting quietly in a wooden manger which causes us to experience Awe and Wonder.

In Lent, on the other hand, one is asked to share in the suffering of the Lord, and at the end confronts the mystery of the empty tomb. In Lent

we travel from agony to compassion and triumph. In the end both Advent and Lent ask us to experience different aspects of the Christian mystery. The Church season asks all of us to enter into the Christian Mystery so we can experience the presence of Christ in His fullness.



History of the Poinsettia

The poinsettia with its scarlet leaves, came from Mexico where it grows as a shrub. It blooms at Christmastime, and Mexicans called it "flower of the Holy Night." It was brought to the United States by the first U.S. ambassador to Mexico, Dr. Joel Roberts Poinsett (1779-1851) who had them grown in his greenhouse in South Carolina. Eventually, they were named after him. Only since 1920 have they become potted plants. Poinsettias are now associated as much with Christmas as lilies are with Easter

Hymn Stories

This hymn finds its origin in the medieval Roman Church of the twelfth century and possible even earlier. It began as a series of Antiphons-short statements sung at the beginning of the Psalm or of the Magnificat at Vespers during the Advent season. Each of the Antiphons greets the Savior with one of the many titles ascribed to Him in the Scriptures: Emmanual, Lord of Might, Rod of Jesse, Day Spring, Key of David. The melody for this text was originally a Chant, the earliest form of singing in the Church.
